At the root of peer leadership or peer helping programs is the philosophy that "kids can and do help other kids." Teenagers need programs that are designed with their culture and needs in mind. The PAL program is designed to provide accurate knowledge about common teen problems and to teach the skills of effective communication, empathetic listening and problem solving. That way, teens can help others help themselves.

- A sense of belonging and commitment to WMS
- Ability to stand-up to insensitive or judgmental peers/situations
- Ability to maintain confidentiality
